What I usually do when a person comes to our desk is say, "Good afternoon, how may I misdirect you today?" Ninety-nine percent of the time I will get a smile. Friday was the Stand Down. The doors opened to Veterans at 7:00 AM. That meant getting up and leaving the house at O Dark Thirty, driving to St. Michael's Vet Center, setting up our table, and wait for

the doors to open. Then talk to every veteran that passes by.

After getting our table set up. We were talking to the lady who organizes the event. During the conversation, she asked if we knew someone who could give the invocation. Miss Roberts Immediately volunteered me. I really didn't mind since I am already chaplain as a couple of the organizations I belong to.

The rest of the day was spent talking to veterans and the other agencies present. Our main objective is to show the flag, so to speak. So many people have not heard of CWV or Fr. Capodanno and are quite surprised when we give them the information. We also spread the word about the Honor Flight of Kansas City. We gave out quite a few applications.

Finally we can rest and then start preparing for the next event, which will be the annual Vet Salute, which is a lot of fun.

Post Name

Our post has been named after Father Vincent Robert Capodanno, MM. He was a navy chaplain who gave his life while serving the marines during Operation Swift. His biographical timeline goes something like this:

13 February 1929 - Born in Staten Island NY

13 February 1939 – Received news of his father's death on his tenth birthday

January 1943 – Graduated from 8th grade, Public School 44

04 February 1947 -Graduated Curtis High School **1947 – 1949** – Attended Fordham :University and worked on Wall Street

May 1949 – June 1957 – Attended seminary in Ossinging NY

14 June 1958 – Ordained a Maryknoll priest **1958 – 1965** – Served as missionary in Taiwan and Hong Kong

28 December 1965 - Commissioned in U.S. Navy Chaplain Corps

16 March 1966 – Arrived for training in Newport RI and Camp Pendleton, CA

Holy Week 1966 – Arrived in Vietnam

30 April 1966 – Reported for duty and assigned to 1st Battalion 7th Marines

03 July 1967 – Reported to 3rd Battalion 5th Marines **04 September 1967** – Killed in action during Operation Swift

07 January 1969 – Awarded Medal of Honor **17 November 1973** - USS Capodanno commissioned **21 May 2006** - Declared Servant of God

It takes a lot of work and expense to put on a Veteran Fair and the outcome is always iffy. Finding a suitable location, contacting all of the participating agencies, advertising, etc. takes a lot of time and work. And if there is food involved, purchasing, preparing, and serving is tedious and expensive. Our post, still being rather small, help is always a problem.

During our last fair, we talked with the representatives from Catholic Charities. They received information about every Veteran Fair in the local area. So, we are going to partner with them and they will keep us informed as to when and where the fairs are being held so we can register and have our table set up at as many as possible.

At the fair last month, we picked up one new member and possibly two more. At the writing of this newsletter we presently have 33 paid up members with six members who still have not paid their dues for 2018.

Capodanno Speakers

Miss Ann Roberts and I are presently speakers for the Guild for the Cannonization of Father Capodanno. We are more than willing to give our presentation to any group. If you have a group of people who might be interested in the life and service of Father Capodanno, contact one of us to make arrangements. The presentation is free of charge. We are not paid for the presentation, and can possible travel throught the state of Missouri, depending upon circumstances.

Veteran Honor Flight

For those of you who have never heard of Veteran Honor Flight, here is what it is all about.

In the Kansas City Missouri area there are two organizations, Heartland Honor Flight and Honor Flight of Kansas City. Each of these organizations, as a what to say "Thank You" for serving our country. What they do is take a group of veterans, fly them to Washington, D.C., then take them to many memorials throughout our Capitol.

I had the honor of going on one in October of last year. The day started out early in the morning at KCI aiorport with registration and breakfast – lots and lots of food and drink. We boarded an American Line plane reserved only for the veterans and flew to Reagan Airport in DC.

As we were taxiing to the gate we were met by two fire trucks who proceeded to give us a water canon salute. Then we boarded buses and it was off to the various memorials, WWII, Womens Musieum, a stop at Arllington Cemetery for the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier with a front row view, Vietnam Wall, Korean War, Women Combat Nurses, Air Force Memorial, etc.

After a full day, it was back to the airport and our flight home. As we left the plane and endered the terminal, there was an aisle with hundreds of people there to welcome us home.

All of this is totally free of charge for the veteran.
